I have always liked cemeteries. That may seem strange to you, but my aunt used to take me for walks through them, teaching me to appreciate the history and the sacredness of them.

Years and years ago, in the time between 600 - 1700, this ground was referred to as a graveyard, built in the yard around a church. Our ancestors had the desire to be buried within the boundaries of sanctified ground.

What a beautiful picture! You go to worship and all around you are tombstones - a community of the living and the dead.

Imagine, you come to church to worship, surrounded by generations of saints who now in spirit are worshipping Christ at His throne.

Years later, the term graveyard gave way to cemetery, which at it's root means sleeping place. The words cemetery and dormitory both come from the same root word.

This too is a precious word. Reminding us of this truth, our loved ones are only sleeping, waiting to wake up at the shout of the Angel and the blast of the Trumpet.

Whether you call it a graveyard or a cemetery, this is where our story begins - "Very early on the first day of the week, they came to the tomb when the sun had risen, they said to one another, 'Who will roll away the stone for us from the entrance of the tomb?' Looking up they saw that the stone had been rolled away ..." Mark 16:2-4a

Ever since that visit to the empty tomb, the graveyard became a cemetery - a sleeping place.

Easter will soon be here. Once again we will have good news from the graveyard!

Convicted Series

We step into the courtroom each Wednesday in Lent with our "Convicted" worship series. Each service put a different biblical person from

LANTERN OF HOPE ENDOWMENT FUND

The purpose of the Lantern of Hope Endowment Fund is to receive gifts and bequests to enhance the work and further the mission and vision of St. Luke Lutheran Church and School by establishing or enhancing ministries additional to, and apart from, the general operation of the congregation with emphasis on the following:

- the poor, the broken, and the outcast
- seed money for new externally-focused ministries that align with teaching, sending and planting
- expansion or improvement of current or future technology projects
- equipping leaders who wish to pursue training or educational classes that relate to mission outreach.

It shall be one of the funds of the congregation of St. Luke Lutheran Church and School.

The goal is to grow an endowment fund large enough that the annual earnings from it can be used to keep St. Luke Lutheran Church running and continuing its Mission of "Making and maturing disciples for ministry and mission," long after we have gone home to be with Jesus.

St. Luke Food Pantry

Over 25 years ago, St. Luke started it's Food Pantry to help struggling people in the community. The Food Pantry assists residents in the Saxonburg, Butler, Sarver, Freeport, and Kittanning areas. We currently have 23 households participating, but around the latter part of the year, the requests rise to nearly 30 households. The last 3 months of the year as well as January & February are typically when the need for food assistance increases.

St. Luke has 20 volunteers that help shop, pack bags of non-perishable groceries, and organize our food inventory. Dave Pasquini took over as the Food Pantry Coordinator in August 2016. Another volunteer assists Dave with many aspects of the Ministry.

The St. Luke Food Pantry has not adopted a formal mission statement as of yet, but a quote from the Lighthouse Foundation's website is on the refrigerator in the Wilhelm House that reads: "You Have Not Really Lived Until You Do Something for Someone Who Can Never Pay You Back."

The difference between a Food Bank and a Food Pantry is that Food Banks are regulated by the state and you must meet criterion to get food (both perishable and non-perishable). St. Luke's is a Pantry and that means that we are self-supported by our members and do NOT have any requirements to participate. This is a Ministry of St. Luke and not affiliated with any other outside organizations.

Dave typically spends about 20 - 25 hours a month packing, doing inventory, developing packing and shopping lists, gathering food and being at the Wilhelm House for the two pick up days each month. He believes that in addition to supplementing people's need to feed themselves and their families, there is the chance to witness the love of Christ and share our faith with the recipients, thereby helping to meet their spiritual needs. Recipients are often invited to church. Seeing them attend is one way the fruits of the spirit mature. Dave said that being able to witness to the recipients in a private and confidential manner has been a benefit that he did not even realize when he took over as Coordinator. Volunteers laugh, pray, and sometimes even shed tears with recipients. Everyone involved in this Ministry has a heart for people and uses this Ministry as a vessel to witness to others.





The Food Pantry would like to extend it's deepest thanks to all the volunteers, donors, and those who continue to pray for this Ministry and our recipients. They are like family to St. Luke. Donation baskets are by each exit as well as shopping lists of items you can donate. The Food Pantry also accepts monetary donations so we have the necessary funds to shop for

food when needed. Check the weekly announcements for items currently desired to be donated. If you or anyone you know needs the Food Pantry Ministry, please contact the church office. If you would like to get involved, you can reach out to Dave through the church office to see where you would like to potentially serve.

There are needs for volunteers behind the scene as well as out front.

PASSING ON A LEGACY OF FAITH



Pastor Eugene L. Reddel Family

Pastor Reddel was born on November 22, 1938. He left home at 16 to attend St. Paul's Academy and begin his journey towards becoming a pastor. He attended Concordia Seminary in St. Louis, Missouri.

He married Miriam Dorn before taking his first call to start a church in Chicago. They had two sons, John and Paul while living in Chicago.

Gene later went to Lutheran Hospital in Park Ridge, Illinois where he began his CPE (Clinical Pastoral Education) training. After training, he began his ministry at St. Jacobus Parish in Queens, NY.

After three years in NY, he became a chaplain at the Veteran's Hospital in St. Louis, Missouri. He received more CPE training and became the Chief of Chaplains for the Veterans Administration in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. The Missouri Synod awarded Gene the prestigious Martin of Tours Medal in 1993. Gene received the Outstanding Chaplain Manager from the VA in 2003. He officially retired in 2008, but kept working at the hospital for another eight years. He was also a vacancy preacher at many churches including Faith Butler, Zion Lawrenceville and St. Luke Cabot, where he remained a member since 2013.

Chaplain Eugene L. Reddel passed over to glory on November 15, 2018. His memorial service was held at St. Luke Saturday, March 2, 2019. Gene and his wife Miriam are members of St. Luke and most often attended the Saturday evening worship. During the memorial service, Miriam Reddel (and sons John and Paul) presented Vicar Brian Bocian with Gene's pastoral stoles. Brian will be able to use these upon his ordination a year and a half from now, Lord willing. What a unique honor and blessing to have such a tangible reminder of the legacy of faith that is ours in Christ Jesus.




