## You Should Go to Church

Believe it or not, the local church is not dead. It is very much alive. And not only is it alive, it is, as Bill Hybels says, "the hope of the world."

But if you listen to the news or surf the web you may find naysayers spouting a very pessimistic view of church attendance. (And we all know what we read on the internet *must* be true). But it still causes people to ask, why go to church? Why should I make the effort in my already packed schedule to get out of bed on Sunday morning? Here are three reasons why it's important to find your place in a pew:

### Scripture Says So

Going to church is not a suggestion; it is God's mandate for believers. Hebrews 10:25 says we should "not [be] giving up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but encouraging one another—and all the more as you see the Day approaching."

C.E. Stowers of Mars Hill Baptist Church of Chicago explains that "even in the early church, some were falling into the bad



## Your Charitable Contributions 6 Things You Need To Know

- 1. If I make a contribution in early January 2015, can I claim it on my 2014 taxes?
  - a. No, charitable contributions must be claimed in the year in which they are delivered.
- 2. If I mail my contribution in December 2014, but it doesn't reach my church until January 2015, for which year should I claim it?
  - a. On your 2014 tax return. A check that is mailed to a charity is deductible in the year the check is mailed (and postmarked), even if it is received in the next year.
- 3. Can I deduct the value of volunteer work I did for the church?
  - a. No, the value of personal services is never deductible as a charitable contribution. However, unreimbursed expenses you incur in performing services on behalf of a church or other charity may be. For 2015, you can use a "standard mileage rate" of 14 cents to compute a deduction for any miles you drive in peforming services for your church. Be sure to maintain accurate records.
- 4. I gave \$135 to my church when I registered for a spring retreat. Can I deduct that?
  - a. No, assuming you received benefits (e.g. lodging, instruction, materials) worth \$135 or more.

habit of not meeting with other believers. The author of Hebrews says that's not the way to go. We need the encouragement that church attendance affords.

### It's Keeping Your Vow

If you are a member of a church, more than likely you solemnly swore to faithfully support the church in its worship and work. The weight of this vow is somehow diminished in this day and age when going back on your word is so easily accepted. But even if you don't take your vow seriously, God does. "You shall not swear falsely, but shall perform to the Lord what you have sworn," Matthew 5:33 says. Taking a membership vow ups the ante of your commitment to the body of that congregation. Your attendance moves from casual to expected. But it isn't just your pastor and church leaders that expect to see you. God expects to see you. He delights in your worship and He wants you to show up. After all, that's what He created you to do!

### We Crave Fellowship

In a survey performed last year by the General Social Survey, "The National Science Foundation (NSF) reported that unprecedented numbers of Americans are lonely. Published in the *American Sociological Review (ASR)* and authored by Miller McPhearson, Lynn Smith-Lovin, and Matthew Brashears, sociologists at Duke and the University of Arizona, the study featured 1,500 face-to-face interviews where more than a quarter of the respondents — one in four — said that they have no one with whom they can talk about their personal troubles or triumphs. If family members are not counted, the number doubles to more than half of Americans who have no one outside their immediate family with whom they can share confidences. Sadly, the researchers noted increases in 'social isolation' and 'a very significant decrease in social connection to close friends and family.'" (The American Spectator)

And while technology brings information to our fingertips, literally, what it doesn't deliver is human connection. We are created in the image of God, the trinity. His very essence is relationship so it's only logical that we want to spend time with others. Gathering with the body of Christ during Sunday services provides the cure for isolation, loneliness, and fractured relationships. Are you—or your neighbor, or son, or daughter, or spouse, etc.—feeling disconnected? Getting back into the routine of attending church is the simple remedy to bring you back to a place of connection and belonging.

#### "No Crib for a Bed" Performance

Back in the fall, our own music teacher, Mrs. Diane Beckstead authored a production, called "No Crib for a Bed", in support of Cribs for Kids, a national organization based in Pittsburgh which provides safe cribs to low-income families, safe sleep education for parents of infants, SIDS (Sudden Infant Death Syndrome) awareness, and grief counseling for families who have experienced SIDS. While the topic is a sobering one, the message is important. We want all families to know how to safely care for infants, and that includes brothers and sisters.

This past December, our kindergarten-fifth graders performed "No Crib for a Bed" at their Christmas service. The story of "No Crib for a Bed" tells about children rehearsing for a Christmas play, and are unhappy with the girl playing Mary, because of her reluctance to put the baby in the manger. As the musical progresses, the children learn how the girl's brother died when he was a baby because of unsafe sleeping conditions. Although there are many lively, child-friendly songs, some of the subject matter is quite serious. We are reassured that, while sad things sometimes happen, it is an important message to convey.

The National Cribs for Kids Convention meets in Pittsburgh this spring. We are very excited to have received an invitation to present our Christmas play at the Omni William Penn Hotel in Pittsburgh on Thursday, April 16. It will be a thrilling experience for the children and staff to share this story and a wonderful opportunity to offer a Christian witness through this touching production. We also plan to present the children's chapel and Christmas service offerings of \$2000 to the organization at this time.

### Contributions cont'd.

- 5. Is there any limit to the amount of my contributions I can deduct on my taxes?
- a. Yes, a contribution deduction ordinarily cannot exceed 50 percent of a donor's adjusted gross income (a 30 percent rule applies in some cases). Donors who exceed these limits may be able to "carry over" their excess contribution and deduct it in future years.
- 6. I designated my contribution to the church benevolence fund. Is it deductible?
- a. That depends. "Designated contributions" are those made to a church for a specific purpose. If the purpose is an approved project or program of the church, you can deduct the contribution (if you claim itemized deductions on Schedule A).

If you designate a \$100 gift to the church benevolence fund, it is deductible, unless you specify that your contribution be applied to a named individual; then no deduction is allowed.

Contributions to a church or missions agency that designate a particular missionary may be tax-deductible if the church or missions agency exercises full administrative control over the contributions and ensures that they are spend in furtherance of the church's tax-exempt purposes.




